Planning for Equity for Multilingual Learners

 This monolingual, English-only approach has stripped many of these students of their emerging bilingualism and failed to set them up for academic or professional success. English Learners graduation rates are lower than the national average, as well as the rates of almost every other student group: across the country, in the 2018–19 school year, the four-year high school graduation rate for current ELs was 69 percent, compared to the national four-year high school graduation rate for all students, which was 86 percent.







- That leadership support also comes from the local teachers' union, the Brockton Education Association. The union and district have also collaborated with community partners such as the Brockton Police Department to distribute gifts, gift cards, and winter coats around the holidays.
